sessions. THIS was the true meaning of philanthropy. I still donate every year to HMS and wish that the current Undergraduates would revisit this fantastic opportunity to help make the lives of those kids, even if for just an hour or two, all the more brighter.

Vice President's Report

Thank you! Due to the generous support of our Alumni, we are at the beginning of the next stage of renovations. Over the last couple of years, many APL Alumni have made new financial pledges, followed through on existing pledges, or just made a donation to the fraternity. We are taking these donations and combining them with remaining money from the original fundraising drive and money from the Undergraduate house operating account. The consolidated fund will be used to undertake a very ambitious restoration of the exterior of the house termed Phase 2.

Phase 2 Stage 1, as I call it, will see all of the flat roofs stripped off and replaced. All the copper gutters will be stabilized or replaced. The sloped roofs will be repaired as needed. The front porch will be stripped down to the joists and rebuilt back up to last another 100 years. We will top it off with a new decking system that we will only be able to dedicate with a porch ram! We will be restoring the front steps and replacing the front door. Finally, we will begin the re-pointing process starting at the room 4 porch and going as far as the balance of our money will take us.

As of now we have about \$200,000 to use. That's why it is Stage 1. We will need between \$400,000 and \$500,000 to do the whole house. When we accumulate more money we will begin Phase 2, Stage 2. We would rather do this right and in stages than to try and stretch our money too far and do a halfhearted job. We feel very confident that most Pi's will see how great everything looks and want to keep giving.

Our Fraternity house has been our home almost since the beginning. It has been the home of many great events centered around giving over the years. By maintaining our house for future generations we are giving to our community by providing first a home, but more importantly by providing a shining example of giving to those future Pi's.

Treasurer's Report

We closed the 2013 fiscal year (July – June) in the black!! We brought in \$19k of dues income (\$14k from the Undergrads and \$5k from the Alumni) in fiscal year 2013. The Alumni dues were up by 28% vs. prior year and 25% vs. budget. Thanks to all the Alumni that continue to pay your dues. The 2014 dues invoices will be sent out before the end of calendar 2014. We have made a change in the Undergrad dues where \$10 from each out-of-house brother per term is earmarked for minor House improvements. In fiscal year 2013 we collected approx. \$1,500 for this discretionary House improvement fund.

Even with all the positive financial news, we still need your help with donations towards the Building Fund. In my last article, I stated that we need \$20k - \$25k to reach our goal of \$125,000. Well, I have some great news. As of the end of fiscal year 2013, we have reached our goal!! Thanks to all your donations and, if you have time, please stop by the House and see your donations at work. I am still amazed on the beauty of our House, no matter how many times I have been there.

The Alumni, lacking athleticism, fell to the Undergrads two sets to one during the Annual Pig-nic at Mermaid Lake.

Softball (August 24th):

After falling behind 8-0 in the first inning, the Alumni stormed back to win 20-18 thanks to Jimmy Aigner 's 3-run walk off homer in the bottom of the 8th inning. The bottom of the lineup were the stars for the Alumni as batters 12 through 17 accounted for 14 of the 20 runs scored for the Alumni.

In the top of the 7th, trailing 13 to 14, the Undergrads scored two runs to take the lead as Chuck Vincent began to lose some velocity on his pitches. The Alumni came right back to tie the score at 14 in the bottom of the inning but failed to score the winning run with the bases loaded and no outs. Two consecutive infield pop ups and a fly out to left killed the rally and pushed the game to extra innings.

With Chuck pulled from the game after 7 solid innings, the Undergrads scored three runs in the top of the 8th thanks to a 2-run home run to left center. This set the table for the bottom of the line up to do what they had been doing all game.....scoring runs. After two straight singles by Schick and new JM Alumnus John Kundrat, two errors in the field by the Undergrads, the Alumni were still down 1 run with guys on first and second with no outs when Jimmy stepped up to the plate and lined the first pitch over the outfielder in left center for the win.

Asked after the game why he decided to score an extra run when it wasn't needed for the victory, Jimmy replied "ah.....one for the Pi!"

Our next scheduled sporting event is the Alumni football game which occurs on November 16th. I hope to see you there.


Judicial Chair

Greetings, Brothers! The focus of this issue of our newsletter is “Philanthropy and the Concept of Giving Back”. As Ed Schickling reflected in his President’s Report, during our years in the early 1980’s, we gave the proceeds of our Annual Pi Halloween Blowout to the Home of the Merciful Savior for children stricken with Cerebral Palsy. We also were able to interact with the children through Scouting. Today, our Undergraduate brethren continue that tradition of philanthropy and giving through participation in numerous events. These event include Red Cross Blood Drives, serving as volunteer staff at Drexel community events, conducting local Philadelphia neighborhood abandoned lot cleanups, supporting PanHellenic fundraisers, organizing Food for the Homeless around the Thanksgiving Holiday, and by sponsoring the Annual Pi Luau which will benefit breast cancer research (also, a great way to welcome students back to the Fall term).

Recently during the Spring Term, under the leadership of our Scholarship Chairman Joe “Appy” Apostolico, the Alumni made the first award of the Alpha Pi Lambda Endowed Scholarship to Tyler Sanchez. The scholarship is another way that we are giving back. The selection of the scholarship recipient was difficult which reflects the quality of the men in the Alpha Pi Lambda Fraternity.

The scholarship selection criteria encompass academic major/GPA, collegiate honors, awards or scholarships, extracurricular activities and positions, contributions to the Alpha Pi Lambda Fraternity, contributions to Drexel University, contributions to the community, and a long term assessment of the candidate’s potential to become an uncommon man. As you can see, we have woven the theme of “Philanthropy and the Concept of Giving Back” in to the framework of the scholarship while underscoring our commitment to pursue academic excellence while embracing “the whole man concept” and our founding and enduring notion of the importance of striving to become an “Uncommon Man”. With respect to academics in general, the following time series line graph shows the composite academic performance over time depicting term GPA and cumulative GPA as well as comparing Alpha Pi Lambda (APL) with all of the Greek organizations in the Inter Fraternity Council (IFC). The men of Alpha Pi Lambda continue to do very well and improve and are giving back to each other to help one another succeed.

Every penny raised by or for the organization goes directly into providing patients with rides they would otherwise not have. When we saw the opportunity to associate our luau with this organization we couldn't pass it up.

Alpha Pi Lambda Alumni Corner—Aaron Schumann

The first time I went to Africa, while a junior at Drexel, I knew it would change me, but I never could have imagined the extent to which that trip would impact me personally and professionally. Back in 2003 I traveled to Tanzania to do volunteer work with a company called Cross-Cultural Solutions (CCS), based in New York. I received partial co-op credit from Drexel and spent 8 weeks living and working in rural Tanzania, teaching computer science at a vocational school. I had some of the best times of my life there and fell in love with the people and the culture.

As I was majoring in film and TV production as an Undergrad, part of my co-op assignment was to make a short film about the experience. That short video became my senior thesis and I donated it to CCS to use for marketing and recruitment. This was a few years before YouTube took off and online video was a new and exciting marketing tool. The video was so well received that CCS contacted me after I graduated and offered me a freelance job filming at their other locations around the world.

Of course, I agreed and over the last few years I've had the opportunity to visit Peru (2005), India (2006), Brazil (2007), Thailand (2007), China (2007), Ghana (2008), Guatemala (2011) and Cuba (2011), and get paid while doing so. It's truly been a remarkable journey, getting the chance to see things like the great wall of China, the Taj Mahal, the Mayan pyramids and the streets of Havana and seeing all the good work the volunteers for CCS around the world was by far the best part.

This year, to mark my 10 year involvement with CCS, I returned to Tanzania and did three weeks of volunteer work at a center for street kids. I was able to reunite with several of my Tanzanian friends, who still remembered me from all those years ago. It's hard to put into words what that feels like, but I would say that everybody should, at some point in their life, travel abroad and do some volunteer work. You never know what will come out of it, but if you give it your all and keep an open mind, you can be sure it will change you forever. Just like the first time, I made a short film about the program and the experience and donated it to CCS.




